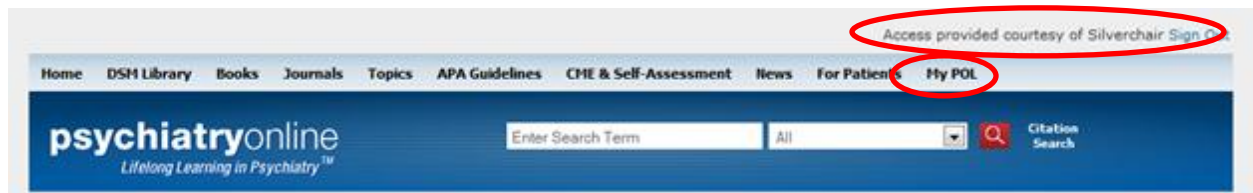

## Set up your personal My PsychiatryOnline (My POL) account

My POL is a free personalized account to access features including alerts, emailing topics, saved tables & figures, AND mobile access through your smartphone.

To create a My POL account, start at the PsychiatryOnline.org homepage. Check to make sure you are authenticated under your institution's account. You should see "Access provided courtesy of (your institution's name)." (If you do not see this please see "How do I get access the DSM Premium subscription?")

Then click on the My POL link on the top banner.



Register your contact information and create a personal user name and password.

**Quick Tip:** Don't forget you need to be authenticated under your institution's account before you log into your MY POL account.

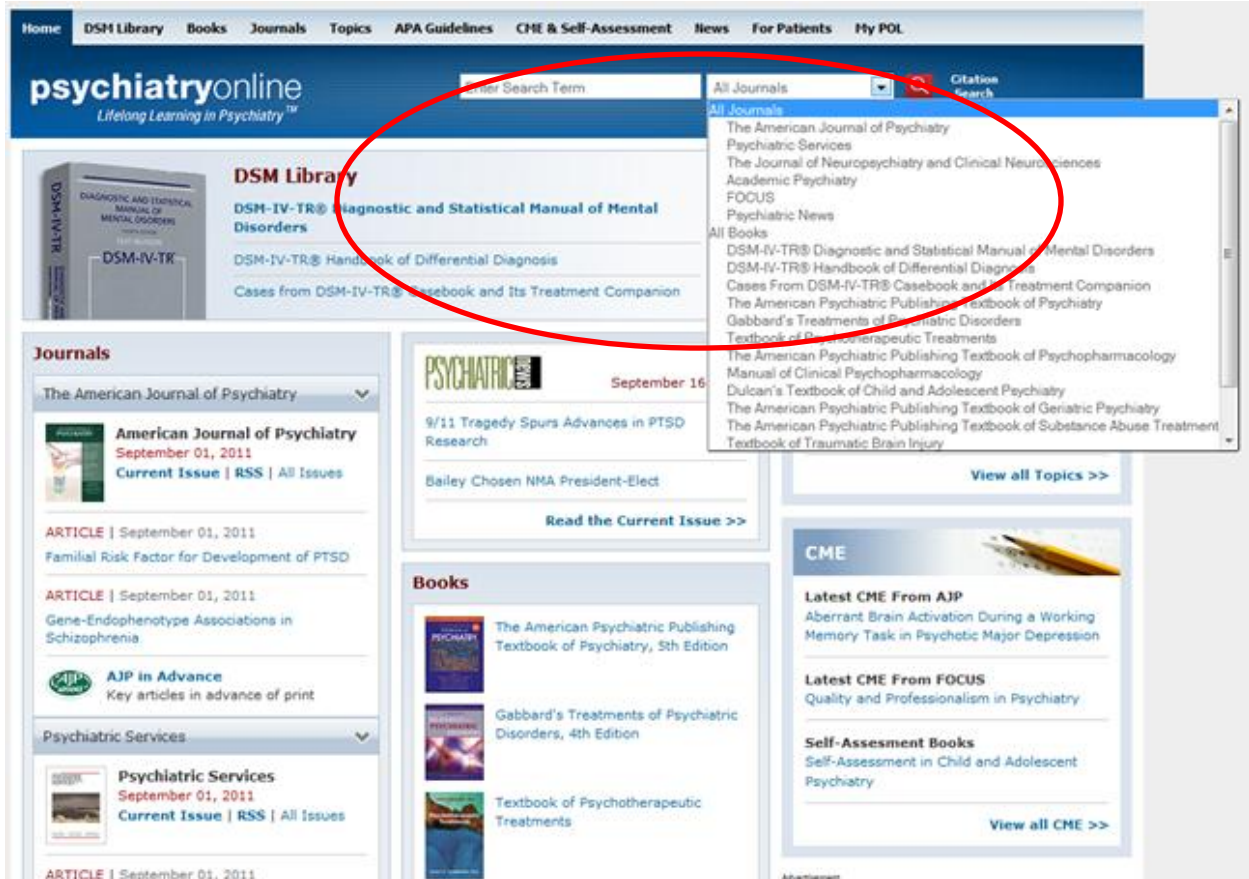

# Research a Psychiatric Disorder

## Search on a psychiatric disorder

There are several ways to start your search on a psychiatric disorder.

**Method #1: Global Search Bar** – From the PsychiatryOnline.org home page, enter your search term in the search bar. You have the ability to then select to narrow your search within specific journals or books, or across the book or journal collections.



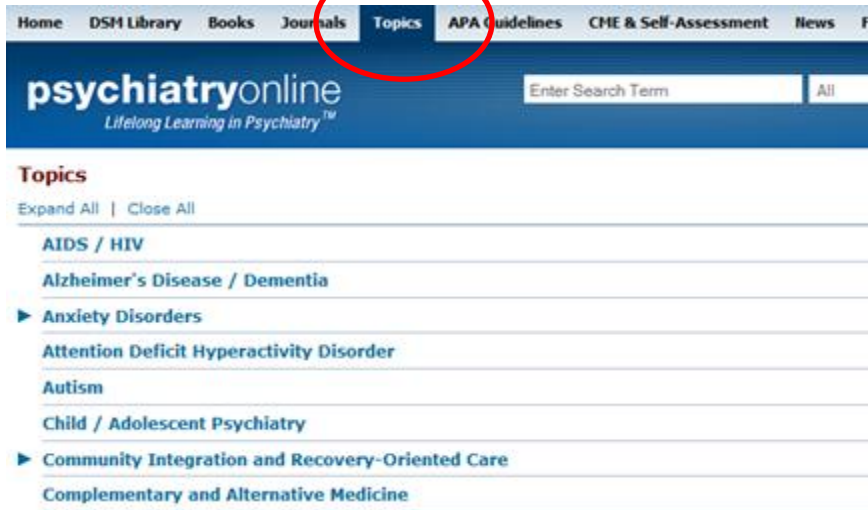
Users can easily toggle between journal versus book results using the search box pull-down menus or the buttons at top left. Within journal or book results, users can limit their search to any book or any journal by using the search filters on the drop-down box or the filters at left.

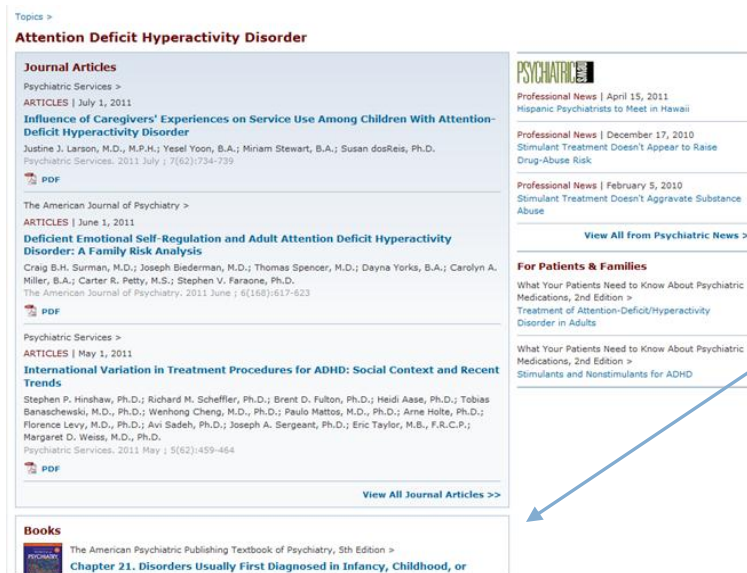
Please note that you can also narrow your search results even further by selecting from the dynamically generated list of sub-topics and/or date range.

**Method #2: Topics** – PsychiatryOnline also allows users to start their exploration of topics based on psychiatric-specific topic collections. This allows users to cross-cut all site resources based on topical interests. Click in Topics on the top banner. Then click on a topic of interest.



For this example below is the Topic collection page for ADHD. On one single page you will see *all* site content relevant to ADHD:



You will see the three most recent and relevant results from journals, books and Psychiatric News.

You can then navigate further to other pages for more content.

You can also search for Topics within a specific journal header for more refined results:



**Method #3: Citation Search** - Citation search is available at the right of the search box. The intent of this type of search is to allow you to find a specific article of interest.

Click on the Citation Search button. Then choose the Journal you would like to search and enter Volume and First Page.

*\*\* The Citation Search will soon be expanded to include year, issue, author, and title.*

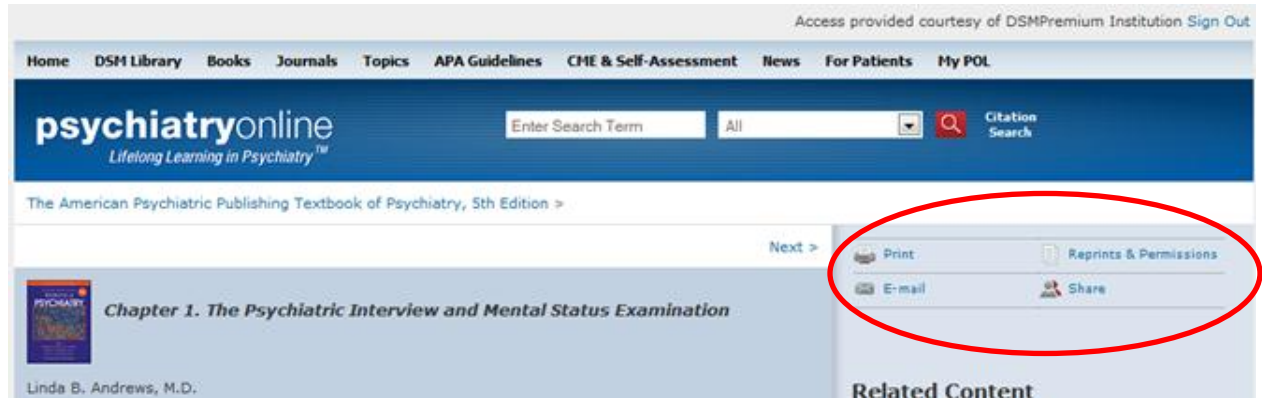

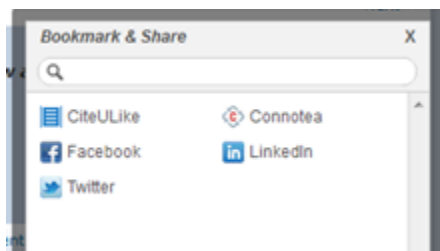


### Email

This feature allows you to share information with a colleague, students, or anyone for free. The email recipient (regardless if they have a subscription to the content) receives access to what you are currently viewing, for *free*, for three days.

### Bookmark and Share

PsychiatryOnline provides various options for you to save and share references with colleagues, friends, or the community with CiteULike, Connotea, Facebook, Twitter, and LinkedIn.



### Print

The print feature allows you to print out chapters of books or articles in printer friendly views.

### Cut and Paste

Have a paper you need to write or want to include a DSM code or criteria in your PowerPoint, case notes, or research paper? PsychiatryOnline allows you the ability to copy and paste information directly from the screen.

Genes affecting glutamate neurotransmission featured prominently in associations between 94 genes and 12 inherited physiological or cognitive characteristics of schizophrenia. Of 16,620 possible SNP-trait associations, 47 showed strong significance.

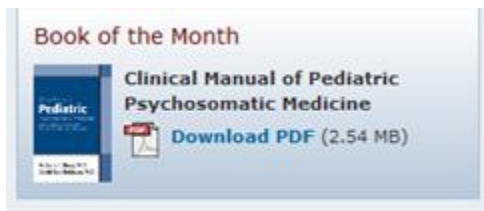
